On behalf of the applicant, Dublin Port Company, Port Centre, Alexandra Road, Dublin 1, D01 H4C6, we hereby submit further information under section 37F of the Planning and Development Act 2000, as amended. This response is made following receipt of correspondence from the Board dated the 4th October 2019.

It has come to the attention of Dublin Port Company that in relation to the discs, which were submitted to An Bord Pleanála, circulated to Dublin City Council and available for inspection at the offices of Dublin Port Company, and in relation to the information uploaded to the standalone website www.dublinportmp2.ie, that a document forming part of the EIAR was inadvertently omitted. The document omitted from the electronic copies of the documentation and website (but included in the hard copies of the documentation submitted to An Bord Pleanála, placed on public display and circulated to those prescribed bodies requiring hard copy) was Volume 3 Part 2A of the EIAR Appendices. This volume contains:

As required by the Board, a further public notice outlining the nature of this omission and allowing a time period of not less than 30 days for submissions/observations to be made has been placed in the Irish Times and Irish Daily Star. The public notice includes information relating to the locations where the document may be inspected (same locations as per the planning application).

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The applicant has again notified the same prescribed bodies (as per the original planning application) and noted that a period of 5 weeks is allowed for the making of submissions/observations by the said bodies.

New site notices have also been erected allowing the same time period for the making of submissions/observations.

The notices state that any person who has already paid the observer fee of €50 need not do so again in respect of a submission/observation.

The last date for receipt of submissions/observations to the Board is the same for all such notices and letters to prescribed bodies. The public notices state, *inter alia*, that any submissions/observations must be made to the Board accompanied by a fee of €50 (except for certain prescribed bodies and those who have already made a submission/observation) and must be received by the Board not later than 5.30pm on 22nd November 2019.

Call for better maternity provisions to help support 'feminisation of medicine'

Doctors are being abused and bullied, and are shown a lack of respect, the head of the Medical Council has said.

President of the council Dr Rita Doyle told the Oireachtas Committee on Health yesterday that increasing numbers of doctors were leaving the medical register in Ireland but that this was not all about mon-

"It is about the culture in which medicine is practised in this country," she said.

Dr Doyle said there had also been no planning for and no allowance made for the increased feminisation of medi-

The Medical Council told a particular, worry committee hearing on workforce planning in the health sector that the number of doctors voluntarily withdrawing from the register had increased from 948 in 2016 to nearly 1,453 last year.



colposcopy services. Members of the Oireachtas health committee expressed dissatisfaction with the responses from CervicalCheck and the Health Service Executive on the issue, which surfaced over

Union leader stresses need for new social dialogue

The head of the country's largest public service trade union has called for the re-establishment of social dialogue which would bring together the Government, the labour movement and employers.

Fórsa general secretary Kevin Callinan said such a process could resolve or improve issues where the Government had failed, including childcare, education and housing.

the Government must change industrial relations legislation 'to ensure not just the right to organise but the right to bargain effectively'

He said the ability of the trade union movement to influence policy has been compromised, in part due to the failure to replace the old system of social partnership with an effective alternative strategy.

Employerrepresentatives

The 20-year-old system of social partnership, which saw government, unions and employer representatives negotiate agreements not just on pay but on whole swathes of other issues, collapsed in 2009 following the economic crash after ministers decided to implement pay cuts for staff in the public service.
